Oliver is now at the Prelude in Greenwich Village, and is contracted to go to Russia with a ten-man band to be lead by Earl Hines.

"AN American Jazz Odyssey," a program involving 40 local musicians in groups representing music from Dixieland to Modern, will be presented by the Greater Hartford Jazz Association at Avery Memorial Auditorium Wednesday evening, May 4, with John Birchard as master of ceremonies.
