JAKI BYARD'S CUARTET, a genuine treat, awaits HJS and friends Sunday evening, March 3, at the Society's new meeting place: Teferes Hall, 159 Blue Hills Avenue. (Again, the new address — Teferes Hall, a larger place for the larger crowds.) With Jaki will be Trumpeter Jimmy Owens (picked in the "Down Beat" International Critics Poll as the top trumpet deserving wider recognition), Bassist Reggie Johnson (recently with Art Blakey) and Drummer Dick Burke (now with Ted Curson at Pookie's Pub, Greenwich Village). Of Jaki's new record, "Live! The Jaki Byard Quintet," the "Down Beat" review says: "Warm, gusty, gutsy, happy, introspective...He plays in many styles and modes, and yet is always Byard...He is irrepressible, a funny fellow who comes on naturally, never forced." Now, how can you afford to miss all that?

JUNIOR MANCE did it again at the February meeting — showed his all-embracing talent for modern sounds, the blues and even boogie in a beautifully balanced performance. The crowd loved it. It was a crowd, too, with latecomers lining the walls and with dozens of later-comers turned away at the door. (A larger meeting place proved an absolute necessity; hence the move to Treferes Hall.) Junior's rhythm section — Drummer Allen Dawson and Bassist Wilbur Little — was perfect for his kind of music, and Marge Dodson won at least 200 personal fans.
