BOOKER ERVIN and his quartet will open the new HJS season this Sunday evening (September 15). An old favorite of the Society, this will be Booker's first appearance on the Nutmeg scene since his long sojourn abroad — France, Spain and the Scandinavian countries. His last appearance before the Society was four years ago with the group he and Randy Weston organized for their historic tour of Africa. Leonard Feather has said of Booker: "Forceful and persuasive modern tenor." And Ira Gitler has said: "A rugged individualist with an honest, forthright approach that is basic, but explorative." So pamper yourself. Be at Terferes Hall, 159 Blue Hills Avenue at 8 o'clock, Sunday, September 15.
