LEE MORGAN, his sextet and Andy Bley, blues singer, will be guests of the Society Sunday evening, May 9th at the new Teferes Hall in Bloomfield. Morgan, long prominent as a sideman in the better known bands, has come recently into his own as an individual star through his successful Blue Note recordings. He brings with him a truly all-star group comprised of Roland Hanna, pianist; Jimmy Heath, versatile reedman; Curtis Fuller, trombonist; Paul West, bassist; and Tooty Heath, drummer. HJS is fortunate to secure the Morgan troupe, which is available only because of a last-minute cancellation of an engagement in Manhattan. Be there. You'll hear some good music. Again, the new meeting place will be the new Teferes Hall. You'll find a map in the enclosed flyer.

OFF TO LENNY'S, renowned jazz spot on the Mass Turnpike, will go a busful of HJS members and friends on Saturday evening, May 22nd. If you'd like to visit this jazz mecca of New England and there hear Cannonball Adderly and his band, don't delay making a reservation. Bus accommodations and reservations at Lenny's are limited. THE TENTH ANNIVERSARY party was perfection. The Kenny Burrell Quartet performed beautifully to a rapt audience -- genuinely appreciative, utterly talkless and coughless. The Jewish Community Center auditorium was ideal for a party of the sort. The champagne reception in the green room gave everybody an opportunity to chat with fellow members, with guests and with the musicians. By way of recapitulation, the personnel of the performing unit comprised Pianist Richard Wyant, Bassist Larry Ridley and Drummer Bill English. Of the music, Ron Georgeff of "The Times" wrote: "Have you ever had moments when you sit back, close your eyes and smile -- at peace? That's this quartet's music." Ken Cruikshank of "The Courant" wrote: "Kenny Burrell knows where he's going and stops off at every place he should along the way."

GRATITUDE for the success of the 10th anniversary part is due many members -- Sammy Johnson's committee, the girls who ushered and made the champagne reception a model of efficiency; Dick Taylor, who provided the excellent sound system; and particularly Harry Lichtenbaum, who designed and printed a handsome program, took charge of the stage lighting, and endangered the springs of his Stutz Bearcat by loading it with party supplies.
