BILLY HARPER, rapidly rising young tenor saxophonist, and his Quintet, will be the guests of HJS Sunday evening, November 10th. The occasion affords an opportunity to "discover" a new and refreshing voice among reed players. Although he has toured with Art Blakey's Jazz Messengers, the Gil Evans Orchestra and with the Thad Jones-Mel Lewis band, and has also played and recorded with Max Roach and the late Lee Morgan, it has been only lately that he has emerged as an individual star. His first recording, "Capra Black", earned 5 stars in "Down Beat", and was acclaimed as one of the most impressive of the past year. He and his Quintet will perform at the Sheraton Tobacco Valley Inn, Bloomfield Ave., Windsor, (Exit 305 off I-91).

THE BILLY HARPER QUINTET includes trumpeter Virgil Jones of the "Tonight Show" NBC band; pianist Harold Mabern, formerly of the Lionel Hampton band and such recording groups as Miles Davis, J. J. Johnson, and the Art Farmer-Benny Golson Jazztet (his accompaniment of Bobby Brown at an HJS concert is well remembered); guitarist Ted Dunbar; bassist Herb Bushler; and drummer Billy Hart. An allstar, compact, well integrated unit, the Billy Harper Quintet is bound to present an evening of pleasurable musical entertainment. And it will be enhanced by the pleasant environment of the Tobacco Valley Inn, new "home" of the Society.

THE BELOVED CLARK TERRY captivated HJS and friends again at the October concert, surpassing even previous HJS appearances with his trumpet virtuosity, musical taste and irresistible good humor. Said Owen McNally of "The Hartford Courant", "Besides being a superb, swinging trumpeter, Clark Terry is one of the most engaging, warm and open entertainers in jazz history." So there! And no exaggeration! Well deserved praise was also accorded saxophonist Arnie Lawrence, bassist Lyle Atkinson, drummer Dave Bailey and pianist Ronnie Mathews ("delightfully bluesy"). Gratifying to HJS members was a solo performance by pianist-composer Gary Vick, the young student who is this year's recipient of the Bessye Proffitt Scholarship annually awarded a deserving Greater Hartford jazz musician.

IT'S RIGHT HERE if you know where to look for it: Buddy Tate, great erstwhile tenor player of the Basie band, is performing nightly at Tobacco Valley Inn.... Gene Rodgers, long an HJS favorite and alumnus of King Oliver, Erskin Hawkins and Benny Carter bands (also of the imperishable Coleman Hawkins "Body & Soul" masterpiece) is playing organ week nights in the lounge of Avon Old Farms Inn in Avon....Lee Callahan and a tasty group is offering true and righteous stuff on weekends at Ollie's Steak House on Farmington Avenue.....our favorite planist-composer, Kent Hewitt, and his trio, plays at the Steak Club in East Hartford on Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays and at the Black Dog in Glastonbury on Thursday nights....And Art Fine, founder and patron of HJS, fresh from surgery at the Hartford Hospital, may be heard at Nutree Lane, Bloomfield, performing on this mighty tissue-and-comb the Hit of the Week entitled, "Don't Let My Hernia Concern Ya."
