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GARY BURTON, by all criteria the stellar vibraphonist of the day, returns as a guest of HJS on Sunday, January 18th., at 8:00 P.M., to present a concert with his Cuintet. The event is scheduled for the Roberts Center Theatre on the Kingswood-Oxford campus in West Hartford. This will be Gary's third performance under the auspices of the Society -- an indication of the esteem in which he is held not only by HJS members, but also by discerning members of the general public. With him will appear Bassist Steve Swallow (Don Ellis, Art Farmer, Stan Getz); Guitarist Mick Goodrick (Woody Herman, Jack DeJeonette) of the Berklee College faculty; Guitarist Pat Metheny (Clark Terry, Paul Eley), also of the Berklee faculty; and Drummer Bob Moses (Roland Kirk, Jack DeJeonette and the rock band known as the Fabulous Rhinestones). This concert, as with others, is partially supported by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts of Washington, D.C. (Roberts Center Theatre is best approached from Trout Brook Prive, between Farmington Avenue and the Boulevard, West Hartford.)

WHAT CAN ONE SAY of the two most recent HJS sessions? Both would send one to the thesaurus for superlatives. First, late in November, the ever-welcome Clifford Jordan Quartet scored heavily and happily. Pianist Cedar Walton was especially well received. Wrote Owen McNally of "The Courant", "He gave the Society's new piano a royal christening as he performed brilliantly". Of Cliff Jordan: "He kept rollin' along, blowing long flute lines over a rockbed of rhythm put down by Walton, Bassist Sam Jones and Drummer George Avalese."... Then, early in December, the New York Jazz Quartet provided what may have been the most "musical" of all HJS musical evenings. The foursome -- Roland Hanna, Frank Wess, Victor Gaskin and Sonny Brown, with Singer Mel Dancy, specialized in compositions of its own, most of them by the great Roland Hanna. "Wistful Woman" and "Paris Once More" (in memory of Coleman Hawkins) are promising contributions to the jazz repertoire, but the most provocative is "Mama's Potion" (the recipe for which can be divulged only by Roland and Mel Dancy).
