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AN EXTREMELY POPULAR CONCERT presented by HJS during the past year was the one in which three Hartford jazz pianists vied in what might be called a keyboard battle of music. Its success has prompted the Society to schedule another event of similar sort. "Piano Styles" will be presented as this year's first concert on Sunday evening, January 15th, at the Sheraton Tobacco Valley Inn, Windsor. (7 to 10 PM.)

THE PIANISTS: Ray Cassarino, Dave Eberle and Emery Smith. Ray Cassarino, a brilliant performer, teaches piano, improvisation and theory at the Studios of Music and the Arts and is the author of "Elements of Jazz and Pop" and several other books on the art of jazz piano playing. Dave Eberle, a graduate of the Hartt School of Music, where he played with Al Lepac's Hartt School Band, is often heard with the orchestras of Al Jarvis and Bob Halprin. Emery Smith, a Vice President of HJS, is well known in Manhattan as well as Hartford, for he has played with Donald Byrd, Jackie McLean, Howard McGhee and others of national renown. Two HJS members of stellar musical achievement will provide rhythmic accompaniment: Bassist Eddie Jones and Drummer Stix" Leonard.
